#### Minister's letter December 2023

I am writing this letter to the people of God as we look forward to a period to commemorate and celebrate the word becoming flesh and dwelling among us (John 1:1.14). I find this period very important to my life as a child of God because my becoming a child of God is connected to the birth of Jesus as God becoming flesh and living among us.

I hope we come to an understanding of what the birth of Jesus means to us or has brought to us and what we need to do to reveal the presence of God to the people among us, as Church or part of the Body of Christ.

John tells us that God loved the World and gave His Son, Jesus, to the World (John 3:16). This Jesus is described by John (1:1) as God and this God became flesh (1:14) in Jesus. God became like us in Jesus Christ because of His love for us. God became flesh in Jesus His Son to win us back to Himself through love. God being among us played a very huge role in us as people to understand through seeing and learning who God was like, by seeing Jesus and hearing about God's love for humanity through Jesus.

God calls us as Church or children of God to BE the Body of Christ or to embody God in this world among the peoples so that through us, the body of Christ, people who do not know God may know God through us. We need to intentionally BE among people to share God with them and coming to the level where people are and speaking their language so that we can reveal God's love and Word to them through Jesus Christ who lives in us through the Holy Spirit who resides in us (1 Corinthians 3:16), the temple of God. Sometimes we focus too much on doing, and forget about BEING.

I would like to suggest to us that we would do our best to Be what God has called us be in Christ Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit who lives in us. During this Christmas let us focus on being Children through the way we conduct ourselves among people and how we are among people who do not do as we do, and be light in darkness and love where there is no love.

We wish you a happy Christmas of Being and a new year of Being God's people in this world.

#### **REACHING OUT**

Our community engagement is going well with contact into a local school, our sports ministry started in the area, the start of a partnership with one of the local voluntary support organisations and our involvement with the wellbeing ambassador program with Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council.

The mission trip to the States was very fruitful as we prepare for the visit of two American missionary-coaches in June. It's that time of the year when once again we hear the Christmas story.

The mystery of God was focused in a child; the hope of God's love was concentrated on to this little one. God was coming to his people not through the dreams of the prophets, but in human flesh.

The Christmas story is well known; we hear the narratives in our Church services each year, they never change, but we do. Our community and our world are different. Our memories have grown, our hopes have been tested. But no matter what changes we have undergone, the story at Christmastide speaks to us of new birth and the possibility of our own rebirth. It tells us that things can be better because of the birth of the Christ child.

The birth of a child is a gift from God. But no one knows what any child will turn out to be. But by the time the gospel is written, long after Jesus' mission has been completed, the Christian community can celebrate the true identity of Jesus. That is why the writer of Luke's Gospel begins his narrative with the celebration of the birth of the Messiah. Luke knows who this child has turned out to be, so there is no doubt about the birth story. He dates back in time what the Christian community has come to recognise in the power of the Holy Spirit; that Jesus is the long-expected Messiah.

Legend has it that Luke as well as being a doctor was also a painter. And in his gospel, there is certainly an artist at work. We are drawn into a drama that is larger than our own; we are invited to share on one hand the mood of joy and hope; and on the other we share in the darkness of the manger and behold the gift of the Christ child wrapped in swaddling clothes in the manger. With the birth of the baby in a manger a new adventure in faith begins. A new approach to God is opened up for us, a new way of relating to each other is asked for us. Because this child becomes for all of us the Way, the Truth and the Life.

That is why we make the journey back to Bethlehem each year to rediscover our own roots in the gift of Jesus. For us, it is a journey home.

## Secretary's report for 2023

Last year the United Reformed Church celebrated 50 years of its founding in 1972. Fifty years on, in 2022, Theos and the United Reformed Church entered into a partnership to undertake an in-depth study of how the URC is functioning in today's world. It is titled 'The United Reformed Church: A Paradoxical Church at a Crossroads' (by Nathan Mladin). Theos is the UK's leading religion and society think tank. It has a broad Christian basis and exists to enrich the conversation about the role of faith in society through research, events, and media commentary. The report, which has recently been made available, is the result of a denomination wide survey and we contributed to that survey. The elders have recently been given a copy of this report which gives us a picture of where we are now and an insight into how we can move forward.

The opening statement of the report acknowledges that religion in the UK is changing - and changing fast - but it is not a simple story of declining church attendance; the picture is much more complicated and the landscape of faith today is more complex and dynamic than this. The report highlights examples of flourishing in the URC, notably in the vibrant community outreach of many local congregations. It also identifies barriers to flourishing, at both the local level and within wider denominational structures. The report ends with a series of recommendations and possible pathways to flourishing in the future.

So where does our church, Hinckley URC, stand in this context? Our church is a welcoming and friendly church and is appreciated because of this – it is definitely one of our strong points. But our membership has declined in recent years, mainly because we are an ageing congregation, and a number of people have passed on in the last few years. Since the last AGM we have lost six of our folk. A number of the members of our church family are in care homes or being cared for in their own homes. Others are carers, suffering ill health or are unable to get to church easily. We have to face the fact that churches of different denominations are being forced to close and the URC is no exception. On a more positive note we have welcomed two new members during the year, and we look forward to welcoming more in 2024.

In the report church buildings are cited as a mixed blessing, especially those like ours, built in the Victorian era and listed. They can be seen in two ways; as a drain on resources and no longer fit for purpose, or as an asset, providing opportunity for community projects when suitable space elsewhere is scarce and unaffordable – also a source of vital rental to pay

for their upkeep. Much depends on discerning God's will for us and the availability of people power with the energy and skills to do the necessary work to keep things going. We are facing this kind of dilemma and we continue to seek God's will for our future in prayer.

On the positive side, we are blessed with financial resources from rents and regular offerings, gifts such as the bequest of Janet Jones, gifts of those who share their skills and their time without which we can achieve little. So, what have we been doing over the past year? Recognising our strengths and weaknesses we have stepped out in faith to improve our buildings by planning to renovate Steptoe's yard. We have recognised the need to engage in mission and have employed Paul Wake as our outreach worker. We are also blessed with the wonderful work that Rachel does as a family worker. Outreach is one of our priorities. Wanting to serve the community is part of the DNA of the URC' is a comment by one of the church leaders who contributed to the report. The Thursday drop-in group continues to flourish and support those from the community who come in. The Tuesday walk offers an opportunity for fellowship and The Tuesday Event serves those in our church fellowship whose mobility is not too good and others who welcome the opportunity to meet over a meal and maybe invite a friend or relative. The International Friendship Centre offers support to those who come into the country from abroad and need to find their way, learn some English and make new friends. Hope into Action supports homeless people and that project is almost at a point where tenants can be found for the house which has been purchased in Hinckley. We are also grateful for the skills of our organist David, for the music ministry and those who bring God's word to us every Sunday. The opportunity for our choir to go to St Albans to sing in the Free Church Choirs Festival in October was very much appreciated and was an opportunity to meet up with members of other churches "to make a joyful noise unto the Lord".

We appreciate the opportunities we have to open our church for major events in the town. This is definitely one of the benefits of being a town centre church. We served refreshments at the annual Car Rally in September and for the Christmas Lights Switch-on in November and we will do the same for Car Trail which allows those in care to see the lights. Good Friday is a wonderful opportunity for churches to witness together in the town and for people to meet afterwards in our church for hot cross buns and a drink. The Wednesday-at-One Service and the Friday Pray Group welcome members of other churches to share together in worship and prayer. Please pray for Churches Together and for a closer

relationship between different denominations so that we can witness more effectively to the community and declare God's love as one body in the power of the Holy Spirit.

The report also comments on the fact that there isn't always missional alignment between churches and the organisations they hire their venues to. I think that this is a fact that challenges us and which we would like to address if only we knew how. This has been, and will continue to be, an aim that we have been exploring since the last AGM and we look to working with Paul and Rachel to help us move towards this goal over the coming year and into the future. Finding the courage and the know-how to share our faith is key to this. Plans for an Alpha Course and for learning more about faith sharing are high on our agenda this year. Rob has been running the 'Contagious Christians Course' with this aim. We need to listen to, and be supportive of Rachel and Paul and others who work in our fellowship and in the community. Being aware of the valuable work that is going on in our church is important and we are grateful to all those who serve in whatever way they can whether their help is seen or unseen. Thank you.

I thank you then for any support that you give and can give to those who are serving the church in various ways. Please talk to Rachel and Paul about their ministry, talk to those who run different outreach groups, the Hope into Action team, those who make sure our buildings are safe spaces and we are protected, the finance team. Find out what they are involved in, the joys and sorrows, their specific prayer needs and what kind of help and support they would appreciate. Even if you are not in a position to offer practical help your prayers and concern are valuable in giving people encouragement.

Finally, I want to thank our minister Andrew for his gentle, compassionate leadership, his inspiring ministry in bringing God's word to us, his encouragement and willingness to listen and be supportive when things are not going well. Serving two churches which are a good distance apart is challenging, and that is only one of the challenges, so please continue to pray. Andrew and Candid have been with us for five years now and Tavonga for three years. That time seems to have gone by very quickly. We thank God for them and pray that, if it is His will, they will be with us for a good while longer.

May God bless us and inspire us as we move forward in faith,
