Minister's Setter

In those days when the number of disciples was increasing, the Hellenistic Jews among them complained against the Hebraic Jews because their widows were being overlooked in the daily distribution of food. So the Twelve gathered all the disciples together and said, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the ministry of the word of God in order to wait on tables. Brothers and sisters, choose seven men from among you who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will turn this responsibility over to them and will give our attention to prayer and the ministry of the word.' This proposal pleased the whole group. They chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit; also Philip, Procorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolas from Antioch, a

convert to Judaism. They presented these men to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them.

So the word of God spread. The number of disciples in Jerusalem increased rapidly, and a large number of priests became obedient to the faith.

Acts 6:1-7 (NIV)



The Church was experiencing growth and the growth of the Church included people from different cultural and racial backgrounds. This diversity in brought church the its challenges and there was a need for the Church to address the challenges. We are not told how long it to took the Twelve to hear about the oversight or how long it took to resolve the situation.

The conflict between the Hebrews and the Hellenists was a division over language and culture. The Hellenists were Greek-speaking Jews. They raised that the Aramaic-speaking concern likely the natives, overlook Jews, Hellenistic widows in the distribution of food. "Widows" may imply any who were disadvantaged in some way. The Hellenists were most likely immigrants and a minority in this new community of believers.

The community may have been in denial that the Hellenistic widows were being overlooked. This is one of the greatest challenges we have in our world and Church today. There are many people who are in denial that there are groups of people in the community being overlooked. If the community is in denial, then the community will do nothing about the pain of their fellow human beings. Sometimes denial of the injustice is a coping mechanism for the community when afraid to confront the injustice around us. I wonder how those who "whinging" about being were overlooked were viewed by those who may have been in denial that there was a problem.

Acknowledging that there is a problem is a challenge, in the sense that you would have to have a "word" with the perpetrators and it's not easy when you are part of the community and the victims are also part of the community.

Challenging injustice is the mandate of the community, not just individuals. We all have the responsibility to challenge one another when it comes to injustice among us but it is not an easy task to do. The twelve handled the situation by asking the community to choose from amongst them "men known to be full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom" (verse 3). There was need for wisdom to deal with the situation.

Fear of the powerful voices who may want to maintain the status quo is a big challenge that Paul had to deal with publicly in <u>Galatians 2:11-21</u>. Paul had to speak to Cephas to his face about being two-faced for fear of standing up for the marginalised in this case Gentiles, but Christians.

Speaking up against injustice is not always welcome. Instead of being supported and heard sometimes people are labelled "trouble makers" to shut them up.

We are all called by God to speak up against any oppression of any peoples by any peoples anywhere.

Also, in March, to mark **Red Nose Day** why not head down to TK Maxx and grab yourself a special piece of Red Nose Day clothing to support Fairtrade cotton farmers from Western Uganda. All of the cotton in TK Maxx's Red Nose Day T-shirts, sweatshirts, totes, pouches and aprons is Fairtrade certified.

Sourced from the Rwenzori Farmers Marketing Co-operative Society in Uganda, this co-operative made up of over 500 farmers has been supplying Fairtrade certified cotton for TK Maxx since 2012 and has been using the benefits of certification to raise incomes and send their children to school.

Our Church is a Fairtrade accredited church and we hope to be able to celebrate the national Fairtrade Fortnight (which will be 9th to 22nd September) again this year with a Fairtrade Breakfast ... look out for details in *Contact* nearer the time.
